18<sup>th</sup> February

2917: El Zorro, Los Gatos y El Frigo Sis Di

An early start following the 2-day ferry trip.

We cautiously entered the frige with the knowledge that February is the month that mating foxes will return to their lair.

Crowbar in hand Simon led - no sign or smell of anything currently living there apart from the abundance of spiders and small snails in the entrance.

First on our list was the to revisit Zorro's Revenge, the southern of the westerly boulder chokes.

We surveyed a small amount - the unfinished sections that ~~passed~~ ended in solid calcited chokes. No good digging prospects found.

From 1.45, sliding under the large boulder Simon climbed down approx 4 metres, becoming too narrow. From Station 1.44 Simon pushed through a muddy crawl to connect at the foot of the pitch/climb in the neighbouring boulder ~~the~~ northern boulder choke ~~there~~ (accessed through the round windows in fractured way),

We returned to station

On the western side we capped a boulder which gave us access to two rift passages which got too narrow to continue.

Next, we visited the Bedhead rest - a draughting digging spot found in the summer. With a combination of digging, capping and

plugs & feathers and bashing we pushed through a wriggle (for us, squeeze for most!). Opening up into a larger walking area - sta. 103: 'Maya Tetela'. We slid down a 5 metre slab, the crocodile slide - hand land needed. Into a larger area, in line with Lost chamber. This area seems to be very loose - lots of loose debris. Looking over a rubble bank we could see what appeared to be a 15 metre pitch. Simon climbed through the boulders to emerge halfway down the pitch. After 10 hours in the fridge and our lights beginning to fade we and stomachs rumbling we called it a day. To be continued . . .

\* Note, on previous occasions this site has been strongly draughting out. Today it was draughting in.

\* Additional note. On all occasions we've actively looked for any locals to chat to them and tell them what we are doing. Today we spoke to the residents (young man) up the road above the parking spot. He didn't seem bothered but an elder woman arrived and spotted us in the field. We could hear her talking to the young man in an irate manner whilst looking at us. However, their conversation ended with her in hysterical laughter.



19<sup>th</sup> February 2017 : Di and Si

Returned to Meya Teleta, down continued surveying in this area then down crocodile slide to Choss Pit. Although potentially free-climbable we descended Choss Pit by three short pitches, 25 m. of rope; 7 through bolts placed. At the bottom of the first pitch a high level chamber can be accessed but it is a false floor with a 7 m. drop below. Very dodgy !! Loose rocks everywhere.

At the bottom of the 3rd pitch a chamber is formed by massive fallen blocks. (Talking long wheel-based mini-buses here). We had a poke around various obvious places but the main interest is underneath the first pitch. A muddy slot descends for m. However we crawled through a gap and dropped a short pitch into this as we couldn't determine how stable the mud slope was. (we climbed back up this route). A wiggle through another slot led us to an area with a different feel - no breakdown and leading us out of the boulder choke - to a 'snug' pitch down a heavily fossilised cross rift. (metres) We dug at the base of this; rocks could be heard to rattle down a few more metres. Peering through the rift an enlargement could be seen, but this would need ~~old boulders~~ capping. The whole area is very drippy. All ropes de-rigged.

\* Note. We spoke to the same young man from yesterday. It transpired that they have bought the house of the woman that called the Guardia Civil causing "The Incident" in 2008, she had made them fully aware of this situation. They were interested but not concerned in our activities.

20<sup>th</sup> February A Walk in the Langdales Di & Si

Nice breakfast in the Hunters; the sun was shining. Taking full advantage of the sunshine we wandered across the hilltops above El Frigo and through the Langdales. Akin to the lakes, the heavens opened and we got soaked to the skin! En route we found a few draughting holes (draughting out with a cool breeze). We visited humade Phiel (no draught) then the back doors to raca 3914 = small draught. Some of the eucalyptus trees were in prayer of ~~the hole~~ being felled. 3916 had suffered a collapse ~~of~~ on the surface. It appears the tarpaulin over the entrance shaft may have diverted the rain water causing the earth to the right of the entrance to slump revealing a small hole - about the same size as the entrance cap.

We covered the hole up with the ready chopped tree branches and enlarged the fenced off area, adding more branches to prevent livestock getting into the area. (goats currently in the field)

21<sup>st</sup> February,  
El Frigo. 3917 Si & Di

WERE RETURNED TO MEYA TELETA TO CLEAR UP THE REMAINING LEADS. A FEW ROUNDS OF CARBS ACCESSED A NARROW PASSAGE TO THE RIGHT OF CROCODILE SLIDE, UNFORTUNATELY THIS WAS ONLY A FEW METERS LONG ENDING EITHER TOO TIGHT OR CHOKED UP.

GOING BACK DOWN CROCODILE SLIDE WE DECIDED TO INVESTIGATE THE AREA AT THE BOTTOM OF THE FIRST PITCH OF CHASS PIT.  
 \*CAUTION\* THIS WHOLE AREA IS A FALSE FLOOR comprising of COLLAPSED BLOCKS OVER A 10m DEEP.

NOT WANTING TO EXPERIENCE THE 'PETE NOLL' EFFECT I CAUTIOUSLY PLACED A COUPLE OF BOLTS AND TIPTOED ROUND THE CHAMBER ON THE END OF A ROPE - NOTHING INTERESTING WAS FOUND.

DI TOOK SOME PHOTOS AND WE FINISHED SURVEYING UP A SHORT CLIMB UP IN MEYA TELGTA - THIS CHAMBER VERY CLOSE TO THE CHAMBER NEXT TO L.O.S.T. CHAMBER (A VISUAL CONNECTION?)

FINALLY WE RETURNED TO THE MAIN SYSTEM AND COMPLETED THE SURVEY OF 'GOAT HORN CORRIDOR' IN THE UPPER LEVEL.

OUT SNUTTLING AT THE SIX BAGS OF GEAR WE HAD ACCUMULATED DOWN THE COUS PROVED STRAIGHT FORWARD. APPROACHING THE EXIT A WHIFF OF ANIMAL WAS DETECTED RASING OUR PULSES, HOWEVER IT TURNED OUT TO BE THE LOCAL GOATS!!!

22<sup>nd</sup> FEB 14 SILD 1 - SURVEYED WITH DISTO X & PDA  
 (3115) TORCA DEL NOMBRE

THIS SITE BEING A PROMINENT SNOUT HIGH UP ON THE HILLSIDE OVERLOOKING 'THE DIG SHOW ROOM', FOR SOME REASON HAS ALWAYS INTERESTED ME DESPITE THE 'POOR DIGGING PROSPECTS' OF THE BOTTOM.

PARKING AT THE HIGHEST FARM ON THE BARRIO DE LOS MUROS SIDE THE WALK OVER AND LOCATING THE COVE FORTUNATELY WAS EASY AT THIS TIME OF THE YEAR.

Some goldaving at the top of the shaft gained the replay on the oak tree and the one bolt ready to the ledge.

Going off the single thru bolt for the final 36m pitch I located the second thru bolt around 10m down. Getting on this second bolt the rope was rubbing, and going off it the rope would have gone over two lips for 25m!

I went back up, placed another bolt at the head of the pitch and one on the other side of the shaft around 7m down creating a marvelous freehang to the bottom of the shaft. (The deviation hanger was left on the thru bolt - clipping it would prove to be acrobatic enough!)



At the bottom there is an alcove to hide in whilst others descend the pitch.

The dig was quickly dispatched to find the small passage choked up. The only real digging prospect is sinking a scaffold shaft into the floor - maybe if Tim Allen & his digging team retire and move to Matignoz!

Nonetheless a fine shaft and worth the effort.
